We will look again at **iomlaid** 'inversion'. We saw **bu mhiann** in **Cuspair 7**. Here it is again in the table: **Is miann** 'desire' and **Bu mhiann** 'would desire':

We need to use inversion with the other modal phrases we've learned, when these are used with a direct object. Some of these phrases are given in the table below:

Is dòcha gum bu mhiann... | Maybe would desire...

In **A2 Cuspair 3**, we saw that we can use phrases like: **Tha mi an dòchas...** and **Tha** eagal orm... before subordinate clauses using ... gun... or ... nach... with the dependent form of the verb.

Is mathaid | perhaps, perchance Is dòcha | maybe, possibly Math dh'fhaodte | possibly, perhaps

We have seen earlier in the course that subordinate clauses with ... gun | ... nach can be introduced with phrases like: tha mi an dòchas or tha eagal orm, where we are prefacing the following statement with doubt, hope, fear, etc. Other common phrases for doing this are; mathaid 'perhaps', is docha 'maybe', and math dh'fhaodte 'possibly'.

- Is dòcha 🗸 gum bu mhiann leis an càr a ghlanadh. Maybe he would wish to clean the car.
- Is mathaid gum b' urrainn dhuinn a dhol ann còmhla. Perhaps we could go there together.
- Math dh'fhaodte onach toil leatha ball-coise. Possibly she doesn't like football.



Dè tha thu ag iarraidh? | What do you want?

This section introduces some new vocabulary for talking about things we might want.

beartach adj | rich soirbheas m | success saidhbhreas m | opulence iarrtas m | demand, request **carthannas** *m* | charity **beartas** *m* | wealth, riches

If we are saying that we want a noun, we need to change the order of the sentence. We saw the rules for iomlaid 'inversion' first in A2 Cuspair 12, we saw this again with bu mhiann in B1 Cuspair 7.

Iomlaid 'inversion' is where the order of a direct object and main verb are swapped around. There are a few structures which cause inversion, but the most common one is **mòdail** 'modal' verbs or phrases. This simply means verbs or phrases which express 'desire', 'ability' or 'necessity' to do something. The rules and patterns for abairtean mòdail 'modal phrases' was introduced in A2 Cuspair 12.

The following table explains the rules for verbal nouns after inversion. These take what is called the 'infinitive particle', an a which lenites consonants where possible, but disappears before a vowel.

NA RIAGHAILTEAN | THE RULES

- 1. Verbal nouns starting with a lenitable **connrag** 'consonant': **a + lenition**:
- A bheil thu math air biadh Eadailteach a chòcaireachd?
- Am biodh e **comasach dhut** taic a **thoirt** dhomh?
- Nach urrainn dhut a' cheist seo a fhreagairt?
- Verbal nouns starting with I, n, r, sg, st, sp: a but no lenition:
- An urrainn dhut leabhar Gàidhlig a leughadh?
- Tha mi **math air** rèisean a ruith.
- Is toil leam litrichean a sgrìobhadh.
- 3. Verbal nouns starting with a fuaimreag 'vowel': no a and no lenition:
- **'S toil leam** cofaidh **ol**.
- Am faod mi biadh ithe an seo?
- Chan urrainn dhomh Gearmailtis ionnsachadh!
- 4. Verbal nouns starting with **f + fuaimreag** 'f + vowel': **lenition** but **no a**
- Feumaidh mi an càr agam fhàgail an seo.
- Am faod mi am film seo fhaicinn?
- Am faod mi peansail fhaighinn?

Rùintean na Bliadhn' Ùire | New Year Resolutions

In this part of the lesson, we talk about **Rùintean na Bliadhn' Ùire** we made this year. When we speak about this topic, we are saying what we are a' dol a dhèanamh 'going' to do' a' dol a 'going to' + lenited verbal noun. We first saw this in A2 Cuspair 3.



We can use a' dol a... 'going to...' to talk about plans that we have for the future. The verbal noun which follows a 'to' will be lenited where possible, verbal nouns starting with vowels take **dh'** and verbs beginning with f + vowel will take **dh'fh** + vowel:

- Nach eil i a' dol a thogail taigh?
- Tha esan a' dol a sgrìobhadh leabhar.
- Chan eil mi a' dol a dh'òl cofaidh.
- A bheil thu a' dol a dh'fhàgail d' obair?

This structure can also be used where a pronoun is the object of the verbal noun using gam, gad, ga, etc.:

- Nach robh sibhse a' dol ga dhèanamh? | Weren't you going to do it?
- Tha sinn a' dol gam fosgladh a dh'aithghearr. | We are going to open them soon.
- Tha iad a' dol gam thogail an seo. | They are going to pick me up here.

Chuir mi romham... | I decided...

In **Cuspair 10**, we saw that we can use the preposition **ro** to say 'before'. **Ro** works with the pronouns in the same way we learned with every other simple preposition up to now. The prepositional pronoun forms of **ro** are give in the table to the right. **Ro** becomes **ron** 'before the' when used with a definite noun. It is also used in many idiomatic phrases, like **a-riamh roimhe** 'ever before'.

Dhèanainn a' chùis air... | I'd manage to...

In the **Combradh** we heard Sophie talking about the things that she would be able to do if she would move to the Islands. She used the structure: rach aig air 'manage to'. She used the structure in the **tràth cumhach** 'conditional tense', but it works in the other tenses as well.

Dheidheadh agam air obair ann am bùth, dheidheadh agam air frithealadh ann an taigh-òsta agus dheidheadh agam air glanadh a dhèanamh ann an taigh-aoigheachd.

This phrase **rach aig air** is another **abairt mhòdail** 'modal phrase' because it is speaking about our ability to do something, and therefore, it causes inversion with a direct object.

Thèid agam air... | I will manage to ... B' urrainn dhomh... I could ... **Dhèanainn a' chùis air...** I would manage to ... [lit. I would do the matter on...]

Bidh e comasach dhomh... I will be capable of ...

Rachadh agam air... | I would manage to ...

Dhèanainn an gnothach air... I would manage to ... [lit. I would do the business on...]

Dh'fheumainn sin a dhèanamh | I'd have to do that

We saw the gnìomhair neo-iomlan 'defective verb' feum 'must, need to' in A2 Cuspair **9**. This verb only has future and conditional forms:

- Feumaidh mi falbh an-dràsta.
- Am feum sinn am film fhaicinn?

Here we look at the verb **feum** in the conditional tense:

There are different modal expressions we can use in Gaelic to express 'must, need':

- 'S fheudar | B' fheudar dhomh... I have to I had to...
- Thig orm.. | Thàinig orm... I will have to... | I had to... (be made to)
- Bha | Tha | Bidh agam ri... I had | have | will have to...
- Bha | Tha | Bidh feum agam... I had | have | will have need to..
